2022/2023 - PE and Sport Premium Spending and Outcomes

At Stonegate CE Primary School we recognise the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of the children. We believe that innovated, varied PE curriculum and extra-curricular activities and opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, self-esteem, attitude to learning and achievement of all our children. Physical education and sport contribute to the holistic development of children; through participation in sport and physical education, the children learn more about key values such as team work, fair play and respect for themselves and others. There is significant evidence to show the positive effects of sport and exercise on children's health, growth and development. Sport also provides a healthy environment for young people to learn how to deal with competition and how to cope with both winning and losing.

Purpose of the funding to:

- develop or add to the PE, physical activity and sport that your school provides
- build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

The PE and sport premium to secure improvements in the following 5 key indicators:

1. Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity, for example by:

- providing targeted activities or support to involve and encourage the least active children
- encouraging active play during break times and lunchtimes
- establishing, extending or funding attendance of school sport clubs and activities and holiday clubs, or broadening the variety offered
- adopting an active mile initiative
- raising attainment in primary school swimming to meet requirements of the national curriculum before the end of key stage 2. Every child should leave primary school able to swim

2. <u>Profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school</u> improvement, for example by:

- actively encourage pupils to take on leadership or volunteer roles that support the delivery of sport and physical activity within the school (such as 'sport leader' or peer-mentoring schemes)
- embedding physical activity into the school day through encouraging active travel to and from school, active break times and holding active lessons and teaching

3. <u>Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport, for example by:</u>

- providing staff with professional development, mentoring, appropriate training and resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively to all pupils, and embed physical activity across your school hiring qualified sports coaches and PE specialists to work alongside teachers to enhance or extend current opportunities offered to pupils

4. <u>Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils, for example by:</u>

- introducing a new range of sports and physical activities (such as dance, yoga or fitness sessions) to encourage more pupils to take up sport and physical activities
- partnering with other schools to run sports and physical activities and clubs

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- providing more and broadening the variety of extra-curricular activities after school in the 3 to 6pm window, delivered by the school or other local sports organisations

5. <u>Increased participation in competitive sport, for example by:</u>

- increasing and actively encouraging pupils' participation in the School Games
- organising, coordinating or entering more sport competitions or tournaments within the school or across the local area, including those run by sporting organisations

 Children in Year 5/6 took part in a number of outdoor and adventurous activities. This had been missing from their time at the school.

Review and reflection

- July 2023 The school was awarded Gold Level for the Sports Mark
- The School was awarded the Healthy Schools Award.
- Sports leaders from Key Stage 2 have transformed the positive interactions during lunchtimes.
- Children have continued to be exposed to a larger range of sports. There has been a focus on Dance, Gymnastics and Cricket.
- The continuation of Forest School has increased physical and mental wellbeing, happiness and resilience. In a 'Pupil Voice' 100% of children at Stonegate School said that they enjoy Forest School and feel that it helps them learn.
- Improved outdoor equipment has increased pupils' confidence and the time spent physically interacting with the equipment.
- Staff through coaching from an external adviser have led sessions independently and confidently.

- Support the provision of Key Stage 1 PE monitor and extend the provision for Reception and the Preschool.
- Further develop staff throughout the school to maintain the excellent provision of PE and Forest School.
- Ensure that the Key Stage 2 swimming programme to increase the number of competent swimmers within the school happens again this year. Look into additional swimming for any non-competent year 6 swimmers.
- To further attend and send more teams (boys and girls) in the inter and intra school sports fixtures and programme.
- Develop the after-school provision for sporting and active activities for children.

Initial areas of development for 2023 - 2024	Further enhance clubs and activities for pupils in Key Stage 1. This will increase the activity of our youngest children whilst developing a range of skills to be developed in later years. Introduce a national certificated programme for gymnastics for children especially in Key Stage 2. Use of CPD and external expertise to increase the confidence of staff and ensure the expectations for this area of the curriculum are met. Provide additional sports coaching and staff CPD for new sports added to the sports calendar. The calendar will be changing as it will be led by Tracey Lewis at Beacon School. Further investigate opportunities for sporting fixtures with schools in our Alliance and wider opportunities with schools from the independent sector. Using external PE providers from within our Partnership (Uplands) to further develop the role of sports leaders and introduce a greater range of activities to support and encourage a wider range of pupils to participate. Bikeability and balance bikeability and the encouragement of cycling especially in Years 1/2 and Year 6.
	Provide financial support for Year 5/6 pupils to access the activities at the Residential Visit to PGL. This will encourage outdoor adventurous activities which will further enrich the school curriculum.
